~ Governor's Cabinet confirmed but no picnic ~ Back to business ~

25 days to go to 121 day

HIGHLIGHTS

All 13 Cabinet picks survived the confirmation process, often after passionate debate about qualifications and character. The big fights and closer votes were over AG Kevin Clarkson, Public Safety's Amanda Price, Adam Crum for HSS, and DEC's Jason Brune. The rest were near unanimous or unanimous.

But Governor Dunleavy lost seven other nominees (out of 88), including former Judge Karl Johnstone - Fish Board; legalization opponent Vivian Stiver - Marijuana Board; and Nursing Board pick Marisha Dieters because her seat was for a different type of license.

The Governor praised his team in a prepared statement: "Collectively, we have assembled a remarkable group of Alaskans – from all walks of life – focused on tackling the important issues before us."

The Alaska State Employees Association Local 52 sued the state alleging the HSS Department violated bargaining agreements, state law and the Alaska Constitution by trying to privatize operations of the Alaska Psychiatric Institute. The Union represents 200 employees at the hospital.

Alaska's economy seems to be picking up after three skid years, but the short term future is uncertain, according to speakers at the 2019 Economic Luncheon. Still, overall it is seen as a "really positive shift" according to Mouhcine Guettabi, ISER's Assistant Professor of Economics.

Much public support and some opposition Tuesday at a Senate Education Committee hearing about a bill that could expand pre-K programs. [SB 6](#), sponsored by Sen. Begich, would allow schools to apply for three-year education development grants over the next five years. It was set aside for further consideration.

Governor Dunleavy would like to move 49,000 Alaskans covered by Medicaid expansion to subsidized private insurance plans. He says it will be easier to shift if their financial situation improves. [HB 135](#) and [SB 112](#) are the vehicles for his proposal.

BUDGET ISSUES

Senate budget closeouts are coming together, and the full Senate Finance Committee will start to talk about it this week. HSS and Education subcommittees are done.

A recent poll of 739 voters, conducted by Ivan Moore, shows more support than opposition to Dunleavy's budget – 49 to 46 - but respondents also believe cuts will hurt the state economy. Five percent were neutral.

Various Constitutional amendments are on the front burner. The Governor especially wants to see action on his PFD, Spending and Tax Limit proposals. Prognosis guarded as they sort through some tough issues.

For example, Senate Judiciary considered alterations to the Governor's guaranteed dividend proposal and unanimously voted to turn the annual PFD into a quarterly check. ISER found part of the current dividend is now spent out of state. Legislators reasoned that smaller payments might encourage more Alaska spending.

There also is evidence that a rise in crime accompanies the Fall full payment. The Committee made several other changes, merged the constitutional dividend guarantee with the Governor's proposed separate spending cap and passed it on to Finance. See the proposal here: [SJR 5 \(JUD\)](#)

The House passed a bill extending the moratorium on school bond debt reimbursement until 2025. This won't affect projects started before 2015. The Municipal League and some school districts argue we must continue to fund this program because of the constitutional requirement to provide education.

State officials are still working on the Senior Benefits \$800,000 funding shortfall that may halt payments to over 4,700 Alaskans in May and June. The HSS Department says it's looking all over the place for the money.

Unrestricted general fund appropriations made for a fiscal year may not exceed \$5,000,000,000 by more than the average change in inflation in the previous five fiscal years with limited exceptions. The change in inflation will be based on the Consumer Price Index for Anchorage.

Further, the bill requires the governor to submit a report with a calculation of appropriations in the budget as applied to the appropriation limit under AS 37.05.545. The report must be updated upon submission of the governor's supplemental appropriation bills and the governor's budget amendments.

Crime Bills:

Demands for full repeal of SB 91 seem to have diminished as legislators begin to see the big picture. However, fixes to particular concerns are still moving forward.

The House Majority's criminal justice reform bill is anticipated this week. It is listed in JUD on Monday pending referral and then in HFIN on Friday at 9am and 1:30pm and Saturday at 10am and 1:30pm.

HFIN will conclude last Friday's hearing on criminal justice reform **Monday at 4pm** and **Tuesday at 9am**. They'll hear a presentation on Community Perspectives on Crime. **Wednesday at 9am** they'll hear presentations on Prison Programs by DOC and Sentencing Programs by the Court System.
