The Governor's new budget arrived.

HIGHLIGHTS

Rep. Bryce Edgmon of Dillingham was elected House Speaker after two more Republicans crossed the line (Reps Kopp and Johnston). Since then, three new R's have joined the Coalition Majority giving it a total of 25 members and some room to run.

This is Speaker Edgmon's second time at the helm.

Reps. Wilson and Foster will chair House Finance. Rep. Thompson is the Majority Leader. Rep. Kopp got Rules. Rep. Lance Pruitt will chair the 15-member GOP minority caucus.

The Supreme Court struck down as unconstitutional a state law and regulations that attempt to define what is a "medically necessary" abortion for Medicaid purposes.

Governor Dunleavy ordered United States and Alaska state flags to fly at half-staff in honor of former Lt. Governor Coghill who passed away on Feb. 14th at the age of 93. The flags will stay at half-staff until sunrise the day following his memorial service.

BUDGET ISSUES

Governor Dunleavy launched his plan to deeply cut state spending, overhaul major government functions and eliminate programs. [FY 2020 Amended Budget Proposal](#) - scroll down to review particular items.

Health care, education, marine highways, pioneer homes, senior and children's programs, homeless support, the arts and public media are in the cut mix, among other things. New budget documents say that about 420 full time positions would be cut.

Public Education takes a big hit – 23% to the base student allocation (per-student school funding). The University loses 41%. Medicaid expansion still alive but there may be benefit adjustments. Medicaid overall lost \$714 million 30%. Ferries may be privatized.

Corrections budget is about what it was in 2018. But there are plans to save more by shipping 500 inmates outside.

Several programs are targeted for elimination including: Head Start (\$ 6,853 million); Parents as Teachers (\$474.7); Early Childhood grants (\$1,200 million); Best Beginnings (\$320.0); Tribal Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (\$17 million); the Senior Benefits Program (\$20 million) providing small monthly stipends to seniors living at 75% to 150% of the federal poverty level; Community Initiative Grants (homeless shelter, food bank, grants etc.) (\$861.0); the PFD Hold Harmless for those on public assistance-meaning they may lose benefits for the PFD month of October (\$15 million); Human Services Community Matching Grants (food, shelter, domestic violence grants to municipalities) (\$1.3 million); Medicaid Preventative Dental (\$8.2 million); Public Broadcasting (\$3.5 million); and Alaska Legal Services (\$750.0).

The amended budget also reduces Adult Public Assistance (\$14.7 million, or 23%) that provides financial assistance for basic living expenses to needy elderly, blind, or disabled Alaska as well as burial assistance per indigent recipient (\$600.0).

Public Health Nursing, the backbone of Alaska's public health system, is reduced by \$2 million. It raises Pioneer Home rates residents must pay - \$34.0 million reduction to the general fund subsidy. This will be offset by a \$15.0 million safety net program to assure those currently in Pioneer homes are not thrown out.

There may be up to 25 accompanying pieces of legislation that must be enacted for all the Governors budget plans to fall into place. Proposed revenue increases include \$400 million now collected by boroughs and cities through property taxes on oil and gas infrastructure that would be diverted to state coffers. The North Slope Borough uses this money for most of its budget.

Angst abounds in the halls and on the streets. But the conversation has just begun.

Detailed budget presentations are scheduled at 9:00am in SFIN each morning next week. DHSS is on the docket for Friday.
